

Asian Art Award 2018 supported by Warehouse TERRADA Announcing 4 finalists and the Finalists Exhibition at TERRADA ART COMPLEX 4F. The Grand Prize will be announced at Art Fair Tokyo 2018 in March.

Art Tokyo Association has announced the four finalists for the Asian Art Award 2018 supported by Warehouse TERRADA. The finalists are: **AKI INOMATA / Takehito Koganezawa / Motohiro Tomii / Masahiro Wada.**

These finalists will present their works at TERRADA ART COMPLEX 4F (1-33-10, Higashi-Shinagawa, Shinagawa-ku, Tokyo) from 3rd to 18th March, 2018. And then, the Grand Prize will be announced at Art Fair Tokyo 2018 (3-5-1, Marunouchi, Chiyoda-ku, Tokyo) on 8th March, 2018.



For the second edition of the award, which is organized by Art Tokyo Association with special sponsorship from Warehouse TERRADA, the Grand Prize winner will once again be selected following a two-stage process. The shortlist of finalists was decided by a panel of five up-and-coming Japanese curators (Katsura Kunieda, Kodama Kanazawa, Hiroyuki Hattori, Junya Yamamine, and the award director, Keisuke Ozawa). These finalists will create new work or the equivalent, which will then be exhibited at TERRADA ART COMPLEX in March 2018. During the exhibition, a jury of six international art world figures will decide the recipient of the Grand Prize, who will be announced at Art Fair Tokyo 2018. In addition to the prize money, the Grand Prize winner will receive the use of a studio, and opportunities to exhibit their winning work in Shanghai and at Art Fair Tokyo 2019.

Overview

The Asian Art Award supported by Warehouse TERRADA is a contemporary art award aspiring to promote emerging artists in Japan with exciting international prospects in Asia and beyond. Entrants are artists working in the field of contemporary art and whose practice engages with today's global problems.

Born in Tokyo in 1983 / Resides in Tokyo



Aki Inomata graduated with an MFA in Inter-media Art from Tokyo University of the Arts in 2008. In her practice, she creates work in collaboration with living creatures. Her major artworks include *Why Not Hand Over a "Shelter" to Hermit Crabs?*, in which she created city-like shells for hermit crabs, and *I Wear the Dog's Hair, and the Dog Wears My Hair*, in which the artist and her dog wear capes made out of each other's respective hair. Her recent exhibitions include "Coming of Age" (Sector 2337, Chicago, 2017), KENPOKU ART 2016, and "Eco Expanded City" (WRO Art Center, Wroclaw, Poland, 2016). In 2017, she stayed in New York on an Individual Fellowship Grant from the Asian Cultural Council.

Takehito Koganezawa

Born in Tokyo in 1974 / Resides in Hiroshima



After graduating from the Department of Imaging Arts and Sciences at Musashino Art University, Takehito Koganezawa relocated to Berlin in 1999 and spent 18 years there before returning to Japan in 2017. Starting from his interest in time, he employs various approaches exploring shifts in consciousness, from the use of everyday objects to shamanism. His choice of media is extensive, ranging from video to drawing, performance, sculpture, and installation. He has exhibited at such large international festivals as the Yokohama Triennale 2004 and Aichi Triennale 2010. Major solo exhibitions include "KOGANEZAWA" (Haus Konstruktiv, Zurich, 2009), "Luftlinien" (Haus am Waldsee, Berlin, 2012), and "Future of Smoke" (Spiral, Tokyo, 2016).

Motohiro Tomii makes the most minimal of additions to ready-made items, releasing them from their fixed meanings in his search for the new possibilities of sculpture as a formative element possessing color and shape. His recent solo exhibitions include "Connecting Images" (Yumiko Chiba Associates viewing room shinjuku, Tokyo, 2017). Major group exhibitions include "MOT Annual 2011: Nearest Faraway" (Museum of Contemporary Art Tokyo), Yokohama Triennale 2011 (Yokohama Museum of Art), "Measuring: This much, That much, How much?" (21_21 DESIGN SIGHT, Tokyo, 2015), and "Artist File 2015—Next Doors: Contemporary Art in Japan and Korea" (National Art Center, Tokyo; National Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art, Seoul, 2015–16). He stayed in New York from 2015 to 2016 on a grant from the Agency of Cultural Affairs' Program of Overseas Study for Upcoming Artists.
